


This is China, in the old days. Every day the sky is blue. Blue, blue, blue.



And every night the sky is black. Black, black, black.






One day a piece of blue falls. It falls out of the sky.

'Here's another!' says the little girl.


'Here's one!' says the big boy.


Oh no! TWENTY!'

Lownu puts her blue dress on the table. And her silver apron.


She cuts pieces.

silver apron.




She puts them together.



'Good!' says Lownu. 'Now I have twenty pieces! Twenty pieces to mend the sky.'



'I'm up in the sky!' she says. 'It's time to mend the sky!'






And, 'Flap!' It goes in a hole.

Day comes. The sky is blue again. Blue, blue, blue.





'The sky is blue!' say the children.




